
Coach Tuberville CHIPS Improvement Act

Eliminating liberal federal mandates that force manufacturing overseas and weaken U.S. competition



Two years ago, the CHIPS and Science Act authorized over \$50 billion in grants to encourage domestic semiconductor manufacturing. However, the contingencies tied to accessing this funding are so burdensome on industry as to discourage entities from applying for the funds at all.

Americans are losing out on opportunities in the name of DEI, and it is up to Congress to regain control of these unreasonable mandates.


The Problem:

Under the CHIPS Act grant application eligibility requirements, the Department of Commerce heavily weighs a company's willingness to meet certain criteria related to DEI hiring, childcare, housing vouchers, labor agreements, and environmental justice.

This administration is more concerned with meeting the wish list of the progressive left than **establishing domestic chip manufacturing** that reduces America's reliance on global chip manufacturing.

The Solution:

Coach Tuberville's bill corrects this issue in two ways. First, the bill removes every unnecessary provision from the CHIPS and Science Act that does not directly support domestic manufacturing. Second, the bill reverses the mandates included in the current CHIPS Act grant eligibility criteria, preventing the federal government from imposing its burdensome agenda on private industry.



The CHIPS Improvement Act would be a **win** for both the U.S. economy and the future of the American technology industry.
